# President's Message

What an unbelievable year 2011 was! It was a year that brought a Wisconsin Historical Society Award for the 2010 Maritime Heritage Festival Museum in the Lueptow building, a Wisconsin Historical Society grant that is assisting us in preserving a very unique collection on Wild West artist Dan Muller, a quest for a permanent location that took us through a lengthy process of determining whether we could secure the Fire Engine House, a Capital Fund Campaign that raised over \$100,000, and now a search for a building that will fill our needs and be one that is financially manageable.

This has been a long journey of 22 months going back to February of 2010 as we reacted to the news that the Fire Engine House (FEH) that we thought we would be in someday was going to be sold. We gathered information about the building and began to assess what it would take to manage and care for it, formulated what we needed in a building, and finally determined whether we could indeed take it on. This was not a decision that was reached quickly or without a great deal of thought and consternation. It evolved over the 22 months as we sought different options, talked with possible investors and community members, and searched for a way to make it happen. We had the building inspected, appraised, and evaluated for needs. We simply could not make a purchase price and then also have sufficient funds to care for this building long term. It was far too great a risk that most of us were comfortable taking on. It was questionable as to whether the FEH would provide us with the archive and artifact storage that we needed.

Along the way we have had the advice and input of numerous people for which I am grateful. Our committee started out in April of 2010. That group has remained steady in the quest for a permanent location for the Historical Society. A lot of people have given of their time and expertise without cost and we are grateful for their assistance. Roger Kison, Pat Wilborn, Rick Fellenz, Mike Didier, and Wisconsin Historical Society Preservationist Rick Bernstein have been most helpful.

Over time we refined our needs more in line with what will work for the society in terms of museum space, dry archive storage, and office space. We continue to look for a location that will accomplish all of this and one that will be manageable for the society into the future as we head into phase two of our Capital Fund Campaign.

# NEW MARINER'S POINT KIOSK

Have you driven past the 1860 Light Station since November? If not, you haven't seen the recent addition of the new kiosk just east of the building. The city worked with the conceptual drawing for Mariner's Point that depicted a wider surface/sidewalk on the southeast corner of Johnson Street. When the construction was done last year, it was with the understanding the Historical Society would put up a kiosk and benches.

As luck would have it, an ambitious Eagle Scout, Will Pfrang, stepped forward with an offer to undertake the venture. A project that was started in November of 2010 is now a reality. Will worked with the city and various members of the Historical Society as he undertook the task.



The 15-year-old scout, with the help of his parents and mentor, Russ Klotz, took on the job from the design planning until the final raising of the structure on a wet and rainy day in November. As the rain ceased, a rainbow appeared over the lake to give the final approval to Will's mission.

The kiosk stands complete with a red roof to match the Light Station. The panel, to be installed in spring, will display the history of the Light Station and its keepers. Funding for the panel came from Sue Ahner, who asked that instead of gifts for her birthday gathering the guests contribute to the Historical Society. Kay Goodwin volunteered her artistic talents to do the panel layout.

This project took the time and talents of many people. To all of them we say, "Thank You."

# PORT WASHINGTON CIVIL WAR DRAFT RIOTS

*Although no battles between the North and South were fought on Ozaukee County soil, the Civil War directly and dramatically touched the residents of the area. This year marks the 150th anniversary of the Port Washington Civil War draft riots. In memory of this event, articles documenting the draft riots will appear in the Society newsletter throughout the year. Various accounts describe the actions of that day, some more accurately than others. Here we present incidents as they are most frequently documented by reliable sources.*

While many European immigrants to America eventually became naturalized citizens of the United States, not all chose to do so, some for fear that they would be drafted into war. Many immigrants came to America to avoid wars that decimated their home countries, and according to U.S. law, foreigners couldn't be forced to fight for their new country. However, some men who had not filed for naturalization were unlawfully conscripted.

As the Civil War dragged on, fewer men were available or willing to volunteer. Therefore, a military draft was instituted. On September 24, 1862, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed that anyone resisting the draft or showing disloyalty to the United States would be "subject to martial law and liable to trial and punishment by Courts Martial or Military Commission." By means of this momentous proclamation Lincoln also suspended the right to writs of habeas corpus nationwide, which meant that anyone imprisoned by the military during the insurrection could be held without a hearing.

Shortly after this decree, a draft was instituted in Ozaukee and several other Wisconsin counties because they allegedly had not filled their quota of volunteer soldiers. Ozaukee County fell 700 or 800 men short of the requirement, which was quite a large number considering it was the smallest county in the state. Although several hundred county residents had volunteered, some were purportedly not credited to the quota. Some citizens were convinced that the draft was unconstitutional and thought an active show of objection would convince the government not to impose it on them.

On November 10, 1862, Draft Commissioner Pors commenced the draft in front of the Ozaukee County Courthouse in Port Washington. Hundreds of

people gathered at the draft site determined to prevent it from taking place. Draft rolls and other courtroom furnishings were destroyed, and Mr. Pors was pushed down the stairs. The crowd moved on to Mr. Pors's home, destroying it, both inside and out, in their anger. Damage was also inflicted upon at least four other residences.

Later that day and into the next, some of the protestors returned to their homes and others arrived to reinforce the group. A sixteen-year-old boy volunteered to ride to Milwaukee, the location of the nearest telegraph office. He rode home on his Shetland pony, which he then exchanged for a fresh horse. He arrived at the army post to request aid from the army troops stationed there.

Once Governor Salomon was informed of the situation, he issued orders. "I hereby authorize you to proceed immediately to Port Washington, with a sufficient military force to enforce the draft, and arrest the leaders and aides and abettors in the riotous proceedings

referred to, as being included in the number of those subject to arrest and punishment."

Eight companies of the 28<sup>th</sup> Wisconsin Infantry traveled by steamer from Milwaukee to Port Ulaio, a few miles south of Port Washington. Some of the soldiers disembarked there and marched to Port Washington. As they neared the city, the Governor later testified before the Supreme Court of Wisconsin, they spotted 100 to 200 rioters, most of whom carried guns, and some of them

The Light Station (LS) is closed and buttoned up for the season. The tower railing has been replaced with a composite material instead of the wood rail, which was severely rotted. Work was done by Ed Karrels and Justin Karrels (no relation to each other!). A new front door is being constructed and will be installed in the spring.

Kathie Gordon and Rick Smith will be working on increased publicity for the LS, as the number of visitors this year was down again (1,488), along with the number of bus tours.

We have created a LS gift certificate that can be purchased at the Historical Society office. Each certificate sells for \$4 and is good for one free tour of the LS—a nice gift to give visiting family and friends.

As always, we are looking for more volun-



teers to work as tour guides and to lend a hand with various “housekeeping” duties around the LS. Being a tour guide is a very rewarding adventure and you meet a lot of great people! There’s no need to climb to the tower if that is not your forte; we always arrange to have one guide on each shift do that portion of the tour. And speaking of shifts, we are changing our hours of operation just a bit. Henceforth, our Saturday and Sunday hours will be from 12:00 to 4:00 pm, and we are also offering split shifts, so a tour guide needs to only do a 2-hour stint if that works better for him or her. So, if you are looking for a little adventure on a Saturday or Sunday, call me and I

Check out the holiday lighting around the LS, thanks to Rick. We will be opening again in mid-May 2012 with hopes to increase our number of visitors.

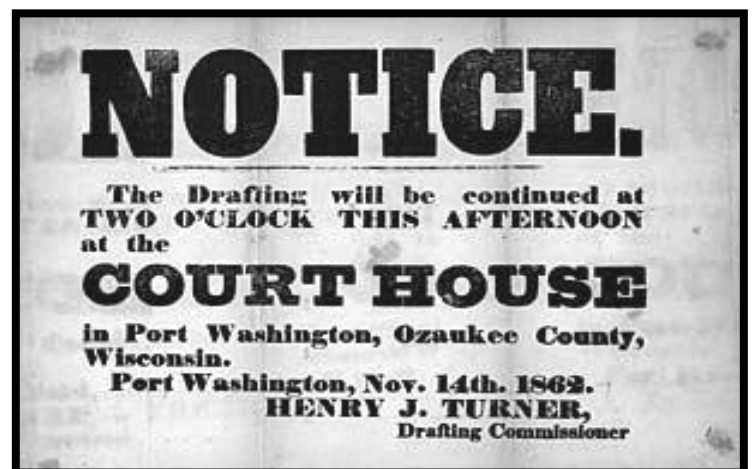

fired on the soldiers. About 50 protestors were captured.

Meanwhile, the other soldiers continued to the scene of the riot by steamer. Faced with a force of U.S. government soldiers, the rioters quickly fled. Some of the riot leaders escaped, but many others were caught. A provost court was set up at the county court house.

Eighty-one people were judged guilty of resisting the draft and were taken to Camp Washburn in Milwaukee, where they were joined by 49 more. The rioters were later transferred to the Camp Randall stockade in Madison. After holding them for about three months, charges were dropped, and the prisoners were released.

Just days after the riot, the Ozaukee County draft resumed in Port Washington.

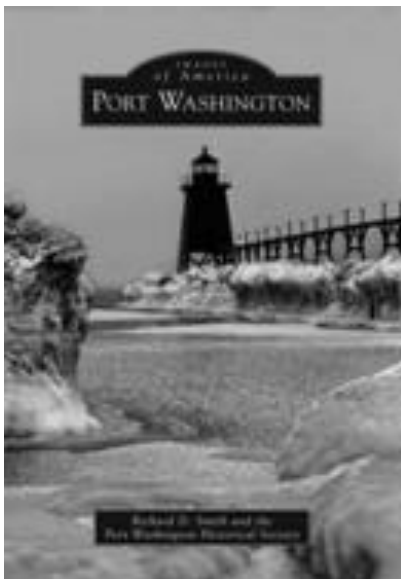
